2013 Thomas Addis Emmet Fellow

Vanessa Lawlor was the 2013 recipient of the Thomas Addis Emmet Fellowship. A final year BCL Clinical student at University College Cork, Vanessa spent eight weeks working in Seattle as a legal fellow in Washington Appleseed Centre for Public Interest Law.

Washington Appleseed is a non-profit which seeks to achieve social justice through working closely with community advocates and utilising *pro bono* resources. Vanessa had the opportunity to work on a number of projects during her time in Seattle.

Vanessa was primarily involved in research and the drafting of a "re-entry to society" guide for incarcerated individuals in America. The aim of this guide is to address the legal obligations and rights that incarcerated individuals have, both pre-release and post-release, thus aiding their reintegration into society.

Other Washington Appleseed projects that Vanessa worked on included; follow up research on The School Discipline Bill which was signed into law on 30th June 2013.

As well as working with Appleseed, Vanessa was a research assistant with Professor Walter Walsh in the University of Washington.

Vanessa also attended classes at the University of Washington, which were given by a variety of different professionals in the legal field, from Supreme Court judges to government attorneys to senior law clerks.
